



- 21. If you had the opportunity to rewrite portions of this movie, which portion would you rewrite and why?



- 42. Killmonger made the following statement. "Bury me in the ocean with my ancestors that jump from the ship because they knew death was better than bondage". Explain in detail what you think he was actually saying. Can you relate to this? Why or why not?
- 43. How would you describe the current relationship among Africans and African-Americans? What help or hurt these relationships?
- 44. Who is Fela Kati? Speak on how you think his music could have been used as the sound track for this movie (i.e. Colonial Mentality, Sorrow Tears and Blood and Teacher Don't Teach Me Nonsense).
- 45. What exactly is meant by divide and conquer when it comes to the African community? Did you see this illustrated in the movie? If so, explain?
- 46. There is a scene in the movie where T'Challa is sitting on the throne. Compare that picture to Huey P. Newton picture where he is seated in a wicker chair.
- 47. What roles does the men play in this movie? Compare those to roles to the men in today's African-American society.
- 48. List any macroaggressions you saw in this movie.
- 49. What was your perception of the Jabari Tribe? What about when the leader was woofing like an ape? What and why did people compare Black people to apes? Cite examples of when this has taken place.


